19 February 2024, Geneva, Switzerland - International Labour Organization (ILO) Director General Gilbert Houngbo congratulated the Philippines on the decrease in the unemployment rate of the country and other labor-related reforms in a meeting today at the ILO Headquarters in Geneva as Permanent Representative Carlos D. Sorreta and Department of Labor and Employment Undersecretary Benedicto Ernesto Bitonio shared Jr unemployment rate in the country is down to 3.8%.

Ambassador Sorreta added that, with the creation of the Department of Migrant Workers, the DOLE will now be able to focus on domestic labor affairs as well as Philippine engagement in the ILO. Undersecretary Bitonio highlighted that DOLE will be more active in ILO while initiating reforms that will strengthen domestic employment. The discussions also involved the Philippines' participation in ILO Expert Groups as well as leadership in the chairing of key meetings.

DG Houngbo thanked the Philippines for its strong proposals in the WHO pandemic treaty negotiations in the area of health and care workforce which aligns with ILO's own recommendations.
